Hawler/Erbil

Discover the great Citadel in Erbil – one of the oldest cities in the world where people have lived continuously for the last 8,000 years!



The Lalish People

Meeting with the Lalish people in the mountains. The Lalish people belong to a religious group called the Yazidi. The Yazidi are a religious Kurdish community who represent an ancient religion that is linked to Zoroastrianism and Sufism. This religion was in the region long before Islam.

Mergapan

Discover the fields of the Peshmerga (the people's army of Kurdistan) Learn about the Peshmerga by walking through battlefields and the homelands of President Talabani. Here is also a good place for some hiking.

Slemani/Sulemania

Welcome to the cultural capital of the Kurdistan Region of Iraq. This city is our base where we will begin and end the tour. Here you will find a modern city with enjoyable cafés and restaurants and also a great Bazaar full of life.

Rawanduz

The tour will take us to the monument of the tragedy that occurred in 1988 where thousands of Kurdish people were murdered by poisoned gas spread by Saddam's evil regime.

What is included?

Practical Information

Is it safe to travel to Iraqi Kurdistan?

Due to the security advises the Swedish Embassy warn for non-essential travel to Iraq. The Embassy do not dissuade against travel to the provinces of Dohuk, Erbil and Suleimaniye.

Airport tax

No departure tax currently applies when leaving Iraqi Kurdistan by air.

Local Currency

Iraqi Dinar. Up-to-date information on global exchange rates can be obtained at www.oanda.com

Recommended Currency for Exchange:

USD is the easiest currency to exchange. Make sure you bring sufficient cash for your trip. In Slemani and Hawler (Erbil) there are a few ATM's. Credit cards are not widely used.

Where to Exchange:

It is relatively easy to exchange money in Iraq's larger towns and cities. However, once you are away from the main centers it can be useful to change enough money to keep you afloat until you reach the next city.

Visa Requirements

Citizens of most of the EU, Canada and the USA are granted a free 15-day visa on arrival.

Vaccination

There are no compulsory vaccinations required for traveling to Kurdistan. But check with your local vaccination supplier for suggestions.

Insurance

Personal travel insurance is needed to take part in the tour.

Tips

The currency in Kurdistan is Iraqi Dinars. There is no wide practice or expectation of tipping - it is OK to pay the price requested for a product or service, or leave some small change as a thank you.

Electrical sockets

Electrical supply is 220V and plugs usually have two round pins like most European countries or three pins as in the UK. It is recommended that you take a multi-adaptor or international plug.

Climate

There are quite distinct seasons in Iraqi Kurdistan, but the two extremes are winter (from Dec to Feb) and summer (from June to Aug) where the temperatures drop and rise accordingly. Spring (from Feb to May) and late September to November are particularly mild and pleasant.

Clothes

Dress the way you like

We encourage both men and women to dress as they would like since there are no restrictions about clothing in Iraqi Kurdistan. But people in Kurdistan do not often expose bare skin. Headscarves are not required. But scarves are sometimes required when visiting any religious sites.

Food

Meat! As with many other Middle Eastern people, Kurds are meat eaters en masse. Local foods include: Kebab, *dolma* (stuffed grape vines), *yaprax* (assorted stuffed vegetables ranging from onions to courgettes), *shila u brinc* - the Kurdish national dish, which includes chicken, rice, and soup which is made from many vegetables such as okra "bamiya", and the infamous *gipa* (much like haggis).

The shawarma shops are surprisingly tasty with slices of meat served in very nice *samoon* bread - but they aren't exactly A* cuisine. Apart from that, there are a lot of kebab or roast chicken restaurants where you will get some bread, some rice, some soup and some meat.

But there are some really nice new restaurants in the big cities where all kinds of cuisines can be found.

Drinks

Bottled water is widely available. You can buy small ones (250 IQD-25 cents). They'll be sold in any small shop or markets on the street. Make sure they are sealed when you buy them. It is strongly advised not to drink tap water.

The majority of Kurdish people are Sunni Muslims, so alcohol is not sold or served just anywhere. You can find modern bars or clubs and most new restaurants serving alcohol alongside the food menu. Or you can go to any drinking lounge in hotels.

There are also a lot of liquor stores. Visitors are advised to try the Kurdish "Arak" (there are many different varieties of Arak throughout the Middle Eastern

Passport

Bring a passport valid at least six months after the day of your arrival.

Bargaining

Bargaining is welcome, but in our experience, locals are surprisingly honest when dealing with tourists or foreigners.

Languages

Kurdish is the official language and most widely spoken. You will be able to find people who understand basic Arabic and basic English. Also, higher learning institutes produce teenagers eager to practice their foreign language "skills". A large number of expat Kurds have returned home, bringing with them languages as diverse as Swedish and Japanese.

Theft

Such typical travel concerns as pickpockets, scams and theft are not common at all in Iraqi Kurdistan. The Kurds are extremely honest people and you'll often witness remarkable acts of trust. For example, in every town there are moneychangers who pile thousands of US Dollars, Euros, Iraqi Dinars and other currencies on a small, unprotected table on the footpath.

Taxis

All cities and towns in Kurdistan are best enjoyed by simply hitting the streets, going for a wander and seeing where you end up. As a result, unless you are interested in visiting an outer suburb (such as Ainkawa in Erbil), your own two feet are your best option for moving around. But when you do need to take a taxi, they are plentiful and cheap. When traveling within a particular city or town, official taxis are either cream color or part cream/part orange and it will rarely take you more than a minute to find one. As an example of cost, in Slemani, most journeys within the city center cost 3,000 ID- 4,000ID and a trip out to one of the suburbs costs 5,000 ID. In general, you can expect to pay between 2,000 – 5,000 ID for a local taxi ride in any city or town.

Time difference

Standard Time is 3 hours ahead Greenwich Mean Time (GMT+3).

Iraq normally operates Daylight saving Time from 1 April until 1 October when the time is 4 hours ahead of Greenwich Mean Time (GMT+4).

Mobile Phone

Your cell phone and SIM card should work in Iraqi Kurdistan if [roaming](#) is activated. This incurs extra costs though and it may be cheaper to buy a local SIM card such as Korek or Asia Cell. Please note that your cell phone might have a SIM lock which would need to be removed before it will accept a new SIM card.
